Youth Information Q & A

1. What is the legal age to work in Ireland?

A young person must be 16 or older to legally work in Ireland. At 16, a young person can work up to 40 hours a week, but they cannot work more than eight hours each day. Their hours are also limited to between 6am and 10pm. Outside school term Children aged 14 and 15 can work a **maximum of 35 hours a week** (or up to 40 hours if they are on approved work experience. During school time Children aged 14 are not allowed work during school time. Children aged 15 can do **8 hours** of light work a week.

Leaving school early to take up employment, if you are age 16 or 17 and you choose to leave school to seek employment you must inform Tulsa. Tulsa makes sure that every child either attends school or gets a minimum education. It keeps a register of young people aged 16 and 17 who leave school early to take up a job.

2. What is the minimum wage for a person working under 18 years old?

Workers under 18 are only guaranteed up to 70% of the national minimum wage, which is €7.35 per hour. An employer can pay them more than the minimum wage if they want, but they are not required to by law.

Once a young person is over the age of 18 years, they are entitled to €10.50 per hour.

3. What age can I get my full drivers licence at?

You must be 17 years or older in Ireland to obtain a category B driving licence. This will authorise you to drive a car, van or 4-by-4.

The NDLS outlines in full the categories of drivers license available to young people and at what age. It can be found here.

Before a person can take lessons or start practicing driving, they must pass the official driver's theory test. This can be applied for, <u>here.</u>

Once they have passed the theory test, they must apply for a learner's permit. They must hold this learner's permit for at least six months before they can complete a driving test. The cost of a learner's permit is €35.

Finally, before taking the official driver's test, they must complete a minimum of 12 lessons with an approved driving instructor. A list of qualified driving instructors can be found here.">https://example.com/html/>here.

It costs €85 to apply for a practical driving test for a Category B vehicle (car or light van)

4. College is too expensive is there any financial support for me?

Yes, financial support is available for college. The main grant scheme is the <u>SUSI Grant</u>. The main financial support available for students attending full-time further and higher education courses is the **student grant**, which may include a maintenance grant and/or a fee grant, depending on your eligibility. Applications open in April and close in November but apply early to have a better chance of having funding secured before term begins.

Brexit update

SUSI is accepting applications in the usual way from Irish students intending to study approved courses in the UK and from UK students intending to study in Ireland, as they can continue to avail of student grants if eligible.

Brexit will not affect the grants available to eligible students. Students from Ireland will continue to be able to study in the UK and students from the UK will be able to study in Ireland with grant rules continuing to apply in the normal way.

HEAR Scheme (Higher Education Access Route) Scheme offers 'reduced points' college places and extra college support to school leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds. There is range of financial, social and cultural criteria that must be met. You apply for the Hear scheme through the CAO and students must tick the Hear scheme option which will then direct them to a separate Hear application form which must be completed by March 1st. If you get a place through HEAR you will also be offered a range of supports while you are studying at college, such as an orientation programme, extra tuition, study skills and mentoring. The supports available will vary from college to college.

Student Assistance Fund

Once you're in college, there is still help at hand if you find yourself struggling financially. The Higher Education Authority's Student Assistance Fund is available to those who are struggling to cover the

costs of books, rent, electricity bills, food, medical expenses, and a number of other issues, aside from fees. This is in addition to the SUSI grant. You need to contact the Access or Student Services Office in your college to apply for the Student Assistance Fund.

Scholarships

Most third-level institutions offers scholarships that vary from academic, sports, arts, research – it allows students to access additional supports – check as early as possible with the college you are hoping to go to about closing dates for applications.

5. I have left school is there any alternative education options?

Yes, there are several options.

LCA in <u>Youthreach</u> Tralee. To join a Youthreach programme you must be unemployed, out of school and aged between 16 and 20 years. If you are 16 years or over, you will be paid an age-related training allowance.

An apprenticeship is a a person who is learning a trade, Craft or profession from a skilled employer. It gives you an opportunity to get an education but also experience the job firsthand while earning a wage. The most common apprenticeships include electrician, construction work, mechanics, engineering, machinery and IT. For more information go to www.apprenticeship.ie.

Most apprenticeships last 4 years , you must be atleast 16 years of age and have a minimum of grade D in any subjects in the junior certificate or equivalent. To apply for any apprenticeship, you must register with www.solas.ie.

College of further education offer post leaving cert courses. These courses are closely linked to an industry of your desire. The courses are full time and they last one-two years , you will receive a QQI level 5 or 6. You apply directly to the individual colleges and entry requirements is based on your academic ability, work/ life experience or an interview. FET (Further Education and Training) is for anyone over the age of 16 years old. These courses are great if you want to learn new skills or a steppingstone to go into third level education.

FET offers many different courses such as apprenticeships, traineeships, PLC courses, community and adult education and much more. FET Courses and programmes are offer through the education and training board network throughout the country as well as other local providers such as Solas e.college.

7. What age can I claim jobseekers' benefit/allowance?

Jobseekers' payments can be claimed by anyone over the age of 18 years old.

To qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit, you must:

- · be fully or partly unemployed
- be under 66 years of age
- be capable of work and be available for full-time work
- be genuinely seeking work
- be unemployed for at least 4 days out of every 7

• have enough paid PRSI contributions at class A, H or P

You can work for up to 3 days a week and still get Jobseeker's Benefit for the other days if you are available for full-time work.

Your rate of payment will depend on your average weekly earnings in the governing contribution year.

The current rates are as follows:

Jobseeker's Benefit Rates	Rate
Full weekly payment	€208.00
Extra payment for qualified adult	€138.00
Extra payment for qualified child under 12	€40.00 (full-rate), €20.00 (half-rate)
Extra payment for qualified child 12 and over	€48.00 (full rate), €24.00 (half rate)

If you were working part-time during the governing contribution year and your average earnings were less than €300 a week, you will not qualify for the full rate of payment.

Please see the tables below for details on the reduced rates of payment.

Average weekly earnings	Personal rate of payment
Less than €150	€93.30
€150 or above but less than €220	€134.20
€220 or above but less than €300	€162.90
€300 or more	€208.00

You may get an increased rate of payment for a qualified adult and qualified children.

If you are an Irish citizen, you can vote in every election and referendum when you are over the age of 18 years old.

- > British citizens over the age of 18 can vote in Dáil and local elections.
- > EU citizens over the age of 18 can vote in European and local elections.
- Non-EU citizens over the age of 18 can vote in local elections.

However, did you know that the National Youth Council of Ireland have been campaigning for Government to extend the right to vote to 16 and 17 year olds for local, national and European elections? Check it out, here!

a Passport Office counter service. If you are under 18, you need the consent of both parents or guardian(s) in writing to get your own passport.
